# Leaving lockdown at your own pace

**Reflection by the Revd Andrew Goy** 

I'm writing this at the beginning of a week where lockdown measures are due to enter the next phase of being lifted. Suddenly holidays that looked very doubtful are potentially possible, as is meeting a friend for a drink at the pub; you can even get that long overdue haircut!



Of course we must all recognise that this is a vital lifeline to many of our local businesses (although do spare a thought for the challenges they may be facing

spare a thought for the challenges they may be facing to operate safely) and hopefully there will be more opportunities for us to support them in the coming days and weeks. But I'm also aware that the easing of lockdown has produced a range of emotional responses. Some are rejoicing at the increased freedoms, others want to take a cautious approach, while others still are feeling anxious about leaving the house. Then there are those who must continue shielding and those who have no choice but to return to work. The reality facing us is that we are all going to want to go at different speeds in the coming weeks.

As for myself, I've struggled with anxiety during lockdown. I have had periods of anxiety before, but always felt able to manage without wider support. However, as lockdown began, I found it harder and harder to leave the house. On the few occasions I went out for a walk or to take care of an errand, I found myself nervously looking over my shoulder to make sure other people were keeping their distance and obsessively sanitising my hands. I will, therefore, fall into the category of people who want to take it slowly as they move out of lockdown. I'm ok with that though – it's really important to first be honest with yourself about how you feel, and then to be kind to yourself in terms of your self-expectation. If you are suffering from poor mental health, I would really encourage you to reach out for help if you can. I found it quite hard to do that, but when I eventually did, I had a very helpful conversation with my GP and wished I had spoken to someone sooner. The thing that gets me through it though is the knowledge that God cares for me and is able to supernaturally fill my heart with his peace. Jesus said, 'Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest... you will find rest for your souls. That seems such a welcome invitation at this time of uncertainty – perhaps you would like to take him up on it?

So in the coming weeks let's accept that we will all want to go at different speeds as we venture back out into the world. Do not get too frustrated with the friend who is reluctant to visit you in your garden, and equally do not resent the neighbour who is reigniting his or her social life. It's important that where possible (and staying within the Government guidelines) we all find our own pace through this next season. We are all trying to achieve the same thing in the coming months, namely getting back to some sort of normal (whatever that might look like!), so let's bear with each other! However you 'emerge' from lockdown, be kind to yourself, and I pray you'll know God's love around you as you do.

# Our Church buildings are slowly reopening for public worship!

Following the recent announcement by the Prime Minister, we are pleased to announce that we will be reopening our church buildings for public worship from Sunday  $2^{nd}$  August.

Each Sunday there will be an 11.30am service, rotating around the Benefice, which will usually be a Communion Service. The services are 'Benefice' services and everyone is encouraged to attend any of the churches as they are able as per the following rota.

Our priority is that we keep people safe and we will be following Government guidance (www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-guidance-for-the-safe-use-of-places-of-worship-during-the-pandemic-from-4-july) and Church of England guidance (www.churchofengland.org/more/media-centre/coronavirus-covid-19-guidance-churches)

Due to restrictions on numbers you must book ahead by telephoning 01789 751546 or emailing the Rector at revdrosgreenhalgh@gmail.com in the week preceding the service that you want to attend. Names and contact details of those attending will be kept for 21 days for 'Test and Trace' purposes. If you have any symptoms of COVID-19, please stay at home.

In addition, certain groups of people are at increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19, including people who are aged 70 or older, regardless of medical conditions. If you fall within a high risk group you are advised to stay at home as much as possible and if you do go out to take particular care to minimise contact with others. Please be mindful of this advice when considering whether you wish to come to church.

#### There will be a number of changes to how the service and the church looks:

- the service will be a short 'said' service which means there will be no hymns or sermon.
- we are unable to serve refreshments.
- shared Bibles and prayer books cannot be used but a printed service sheet will be available which should be taken home at the end of the service.
- the wearing of face masks by the congregation is not mandatory as long as you can keep a physical distance of 2m.
- everyone will be expected to sanitise their hands on arrival and before taking communion
- clergy and stewards may wear face masks and visors
- you are requested to follow the instructions of the stewards. Unfortunately
  they will not be able to physically help anyone who is not independently
  mobile except in an emergency.
- Clergy may not be wearing robes.

Despite all these restrictions, we really do look forward to welcoming you back in church when you feel it is safe to do so. Details of our church services are on page 6.

Following a Parish Councillor's resignation, by the time you read this, we will know whether anyone has requested an election to take place to fill that position. If not, the Council is able to choose a person by co-option; that is voting a volunteer onto the Council at a Council meeting. It would be good to have someone from the Meon Vale locale of the Quinton Parish, but the vacancy is open to all qualified people.

**Covid-19 restrictions** have lessened but, like the virus, not gone. Some people have continued to work, others been furloughed and some lost all income — a dreadful place to be in, terrifying if you cannot buy enough food. Stratford has a food bank but if you might need that level of help, contact the Quinton Helpline on (01789) 549432 or e-mail me on pcquinnrs6493m@outlook.com and we will do all we can to help feed you and in all the confidence you need.

**Play areas** – The Fordway and playing field play areas are now open with the rules to be followed viewable on the gate and fencing.

**Ditches** – if you are adjacent to drainage ditches you or your landlord are almost certainly responsible for keeping them clear. I put up the Parish Council's hand to say we have recently discovered a small stretch which is ours to keep clear and must now sort that out.

**Vegetation** – Is any vegetation coming off your property obstructing free passage? Is it making people walk in the road to get by? If so you are responsible and we can ask Stratford District Council to enforce, but it is much better if residents just clear the way. As part of the Parish Council's rules when we need to do that - we have to get estimates, put them to the next Council meeting, publicly approve the cost and then wait for the contractor. But one resident bypassed all that. The path between The Fordway and Goose Lane had become difficult for his mother-in-law and others to transit. He has done a brilliant job on cutting the hedge back. Thank you T.

**Quinton Neighbourhood Plan** - A draft of the plan has been sent to Stratford Council for review. Once the draft is finalised we will post it on the Neighbourhood Plan website at *www.quinton-plan.org* together with information on how we intend to progress the Plan including communication and consultation with residents.

There are potential activities being looked at for the summer holidays but not yet sorted enough to write about. If they happen, volunteers will be sought!

# **District & County Councillors' notes**

#### **Annual report from District Councillor Edward Fitter**

It has been just over a year since you elected the youngest councillor, at 25 years old, to Stratford-on-Avon District Council. I wanted to say thank you again for giving me this opportunity. I am learning lots about local government every day.

My local focus has been tackling fly-tipping and ensuring that our bins are collected on time. On the Council, I brought all political groups together to enable local action on climate change. Councillors from the two biggest political groups also elected me to Vice-Chairman of the Regulatory Committee. I also sit on the Licensing Panel.

Below are some updates on what I'm doing in the local area:

**Admington – Broadband:** I have helped to secure a survey from Openreach to consider the installation for state-of-the-art full fibre network by 2021/2022. This will benefit the local business units in Admington and its neighbouring homes, who currently have poor connectivity.

**Meon Vale – Area Management:** On my walks, I have noticed several issues at Meon Vale and I am liaising with Mainstay Group to have them fixed. I am also applying pressure for the developers to resolve issues so the roads can be adopted by the local authorities.

**Quinton – Parish Council:** I also continue to serve as a Parish Councillor after joining Quinton Parish Council in 2017. The Parish Council is doing great work for local residents. From improving the safety for children and parents walking to school, maintaining and looking after our play areas and ensuring our green spaces are kept neat and tidy. I would like to thank all Parish Councillors (past and present) for helping to make Quinton a wonderful place to live.

I would also like to thank the editor of St Swithin's News and the team of deliverers who work very hard to keep our community connected.

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# **New footpath to Meon Vale**

On a bright sunny day in the middle of June a 'social distanced' event marked the opening of the new footpath between Meon Vale and Quinton. This long-awaited amenity allows the families from Meon Vale to access the school safely at last with no need to walk with pushchairs and children in tow on the narrow pavement alongside the B4632.

It will join up with the cycle route and become a facility for all and I for one have no doubt how much it will be used. I always felt this option to be safer and better than the initial proposal to put a traffic light crossing across the B4632 and I am so pleased to see it come to fruition.

I would like to thank everyone involved and particularly the Warwickshire County Council team, who developed it, for their high-quality work.

# Biblical fruit cake

My mother, Evelyn Colyer, was an adventurous and imaginative cook. In her early nineties, she still entertained friends on a small scale and actually purchased a new cooker and a new garlic press!



After she died, I inherited her small, worn cloth-bound cookery book. Handwritten, it contains some of her favourite recipes, which I continue to use. One such recipe, written in her mother's hand on a separate piece of paper had been tucked between the pages. I think Granny was known as 'a good, plain cook'. She was born in 1883 and had eight children and fewer resources than later generations, but obviously enjoyed a challenge.

The recipe is for a 'Biblical Cake'. Even affording all of the ingredients, let alone assembling them, would have been quite difficult for her and of course, Granny would not have had a modern, temperature-controlled oven such as we have now. However, the cake is delicious, quite large and suitable for a big family.

#### Here is the recipe:

3/4 lb	Kings, Book 1, Chapte	r 4	Verse 22
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6 oz	Indage	Chantar	5	Verse25
O OZ	Juages.	Chapter	υ,	verse23

- 2 Tablespoons Samuel, Book 1, Chapter 14, Verse 25
- 1/2 Teaspoons Chronicles, Book 2, Chapter 9, Verse 9

1 cup Judges, Chapter 4, Verse 19

- 3 St Luke, Chapter 11, Verse 12
- 1 Pinch Genesis, Chapter 19, Verse 26

I used self-raising flour and by trial and error decided that the creaming method was best. The cake needs a 9 inch or 10 inch lined tin and a moderate temperature. For mine, I used a fan-assisted oven at 140C. It took a long while to cook.

Note: No scorpions were harmed in the making of this cake!

# A look back in time

The night a change in the wind



saved Quinton from an inferno

In his searches through newspaper archives for mentions of Quinton, David Moore has come across the following news story in the Gloucester Chronicle of 11<sup>th</sup> March 1871, at a time when Quinton was in Gloucestershire.

# Serious Fire in a Village

In a yard opposite the school, in the village of Quinton, which is on the borders of this county, five or six miles south of Stratford-on-Avon — stood two barns forming two sides of a triangle and filled with straw and hay, twenty sacks of threshed wheat, four pigs and several dairy cows.

At a quarter to eight on Sunday night, these barns were seen to be on fire, and within five minutes a heavy wind had fanned the fire into a wide sheet of flame and a shower of flakes and sparks had set ablaze a third large barn about forty yards away, two cottages by its side and two other cottages with thatched roofs at the back of the school.

The large barn and its adjoining cottages were destroyed at once; the occupants of the other two climbed to the roofs with buckets of water and saved them. Meanwhile the fire was spreading in another direction: the homestead in which lived the clerk of the church, Mr J. Dutton, had caught. On the right of this, adjoining it, were two cottages — on the left two farm yards full of straw and hay and wheat — and within a few yards stacks of firewood, hayricks and the long line of thatched cottages forming part of the village. The wind blew full in the direction of all these and the villagers seemed powerless when suddenly the cry was raised "The wind is changed! We shall be saved!" — and it was seen that the wind had indeed changed from due south to north-east and was driving the flame in the only direction for safety. At once, a long ladder was placed against Dutton's house and William Hemmings, a villager, ascended it, and with water handed to him, quenched the fire.

Afterwards, the flame was quelled as it was blowing towards the end of the village, and ere the fire engine had been brought from Stratford, all danger was at an end. But no one from the village could go to bed that night. The two cottages and the barn were destroyed; four pigs had been burnt to death; the contents of the barns had gone; and all Dutton's stock of timber consumed. The cows were saved by being driven through the flames. Only the two barns were insured. Dutton has lost £50 and an industrious man named Sanders £65; and there is also the loss to the owners of the cottages, Mr John Hyatt and Mr C.H. Corbett, in addition to the value of the grain and fodder and the animals. The fire is supposed to have been the result of carelessness and is the sixth that has occurred in the village within the last five years. Hundreds of people were drawn from the adjacent villages, Still, the chief property owners are ever liberal in these matters.
